

Uncreated Energy, Trinity and Mathematical Analogy

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Abstract

Light is more than a privileged metaphor and Genesis 1:3, God's first spoken words, "Let there be light," gives light special significance in the universe. Three relevant facets are physical, metaphorical, and uncreated light, and the actual appearance of the latter, in the form of one and three lights, has been consistently documented by early Christian fathers since the 4th century, a time emphasizing development of the Trinity, and continues to this day. Early Jewish mysticism also describes three supernal lights as the root of all roots, interpreting its own form of trinity. Uncreated light is more than a privileged metaphor indicating that various scriptural passages can also be interpreted literally.

The author will discuss a geometrical analogy of the Christian Trinity which displays the interaction of the three persons and creation and emphasizes the christocentric role of the second person, and a paradigm for the unfolding of the Universe. Uncreated energy, of which uncreated light is one form, is also experienced as a real force in a variety of ways, either encompassing the body or experienced in the brain, and led the author to consider the importance of mathematical analogy, and more generally to question the interpretation such experiences.
